In the late 1950's, John Dobson looked through a telescope at the Moon and immediately said, "everyone's got to see this!" and began making large telescopes and wheeling them down the streets of San Francisco to show "everyone" the Moon and planets. "We aren't born in San Francisco, we aren't born in California, we aren't born in the United States, we aren't even born on Earth – we're born into this UNIVERSE, and we need to know about it!"
